Wishing you all a very Merry Christmas and a peaceful and happy new year. Tina




Used Postage Stamps

Bell Ringing by Peter Hartley

"Ringing the changes" is a saying derived from bell ringing for method ringing involves constantly changing the order in which the bells sound in accordance with the particular pattern of the named method being rung. In a 45 minute Quarter Peal there are 1,260 changes and in a 3 hour Full Peal 5,040 changes. With concentration and skill the ringer has to weave his bell in the exact and ever changing order amongst the other bells.

Change occurs constantly whatever we may wish. The bell ringers of Lindfield Church in West Sussex had planned for the historic Whitechapel Bell Foundry in the City of London to cast them a new ring of 8 bells. But, after centuries of trading, Whitechapel's folded. Plans changed and fortunately the Westley Group of Stoke-on-Trent cast their new bells and Whites of Appleton installed them on a new metal frame. Amidst change a solution had been found.

This year has seen dramatic change. Three months after the celebration of the first ever Platinum Jubilee Queen Elizabeth II died and the Reign of King Charles III began. The immaculate ceremonial in Edinburgh, London and Windsor following the death of our beloved Sovereign was everything that the late Queen merited at the end of a long life of duty and service. Our Head of State changed and our head of government changed with bewildering frequency resulting in three Prime Ministers in seven weeks. Liz Truss established a new record of brevity of 44 days for being Prime Minister; a pub quiz answer for years to come. Hopefully change can now be replaced by solutions.

2022 has joined the year of the threes. 1936 the year of the 3 Kings: 1978 of 3 Popes: 2022 of 3 Prime Ministers. Name those involved in your Christmas Ouiz.

Change goes on and Christmas will come when the Cobham bell ringers will hope to ring the changes. For certain we ringers wish everybody a very Happy Christmas.

North Kent Embroiderers

This month we were delighted to welcome Diana Springall to talk to our group. Diana lives locally and still works as a designer and maker in her home studio. She was born and grew up in India and has travelled widely since then with her pieces exhibited all over the world. Diana has been chairman of both The Embroiderers' Guild and The Society of Designer-Craftsmen.



She explained how as a child she had so much freedom as she didn't attend school until the age of nine when her family returned to the UK from India. Her mother embroidered but it was a wonderful art teacher who inspired her to follow her dream of a career art. During her time at Goldsmiths in the late 50's, embroidery was regarded as being of equal value to painting, illustration and sculpture and thus her life in Textile Art began.

Diana's story is a fascinating one, with widely varied commissioned works for the Japanese Bank, a Jewish synagogue etc. Her travels have influenced her greatly and her passion for embroidery has led her over the last forty years to develop The Diana Springall Collection https://dianaspringallcollection.co.uk/ showcasing the works of many well known textile artists including Jean

of many well known textile artists including Jean Littlejohn, Alice Kettle and Audrey Walker. Diana's time with us was both entertaining and inspiring. It was an honour and a priviledge to hear her talk.

RIDE & STRIDE

Saturday 10th September dawned bright, sunny and warm, a splendid opening curtain to a day of wonderful cycling in quite glorious countryside yet one touched with poignancy as this was a day of mourning for our past Queen, her gracious majesty Queen Elizabeth II, who had died just two days before the R & S day. The strong constitutional link between State and Church ensured that the event could still take place and hundreds of churches across Kent opened their doors that day for quiet prayer for our past Sovereign but also to allow visitors to sign their books of condolence. I took advantage of this to write in as many books as possible across West Kent on behalf of the Lieutenancy. Each church visit then became quite emotional as one read so many touching memories and the most beautiful of displays that were assembled at each table. I very rarely saw the same photographs of Her Majesty as I travelled from church to church and this year it also gave me an opportunity to see each church with its welcomers in a new light as we shared personal stories and reminescences of her life and their meetings with her.

I am pleased that the sunny and warm day continued as I cycled on my way to Tunbridge Wells, the generous refreshments and kindly welcomers kept me energised so I was able to cycle briskly back home via Hadlow, Wateringbury and West Malling passing another 14 churches on my list to visit. However, time was against me, probably because I was spending extra time in each church this year and so I only managed to visit 56 churches by 6 o'clock and could see the next 4 churches a few miles ahead but these don't count as after 6.00 all the signing in sheets are removed. However I cycled on after West Malling to Cobham, in the dark, but refreshed by a lengthy stay in a local hostelry! I had spent a most inspiring day cycling the most beautiful countryside of the realm. But most importantly from all of this our three places of worship - Luddesdown, Sole Street and Cobham will each benefit from the funds raised through all of your most generous sponsorships. St. Peter & St. Paul church in Luddesdown sponsorship came to £980, St. Mary Magdalene in Cobham £1095 and St. Mary Church Room £1005. Such an enthusiastic support by these three churches for R & S should encourage them to apply for a grant from the Friends of Kent Churches organisation who support the R&S contributors. Thank you all for your outstanding generosity this year and to all the welcomers for their kindnesses.

Gardening for a Wilder Kent

Members of the KWT who live nearby were encouraging everyone to enter the "Wild About Gardens" scheme in 2019 and Shorne Churchyard received an award together with a number of outstanding gardens. This is now "Gardening for a Wilder Kent". YOU can make a difference to the wildlife in Kent.

Our gardens have become a welcome refuge in recent times. If you look carefully you can see everyday changes and the wildlife that visits. You will have seen and heard that we are facing population crashes in species and numbers of animals, plants and insects. We can reverse this together. Wildlife needs food, water and shelter and gardens are often an untapped potential, providing thousands of hectares of soils with millions of soil improving organisms, miles of ribbons of flowers through our villages for pollinating insects and thousands of nooks and crannies for insects, birds, mammals and reptiles to thrive. Let's encourage more wild creatures and create vital stepping stones and corridors for wildlife.

The KWT website has lots of advice sheets and information available for you to download.

One of the first things recommended to encourage and sustain wildlife in our gardens is the addition of water. A wildlife pond is different to an ornamental fish pond as a wildlife pond will encourage creatures that may be eaten by ornament fish. If you can't contemplate a pond you can leave water in various places in your garden such as a birdbath but do not discount a pond. One of KWT Garden Advisors has installed a pond in the front garden. More on this in the weeks to come.






"THE VIEW WHERE I AM'

BRITAIN IN BLOOM 2022

It was on 13^{th} September following an inspector's visit on 30^{th} June that Cobham village heard they had won the BEST VILLAGE AWARD for the South & South East Britain in Bloom competition .

The story behind all this of course is quite complicated and purposefully involves as many as possible in the community. The village is grateful to the Parish Council who paid the £50 entry fee for the competition, then it is up to the villagers to fund, prepare and look after the village throughout the year. Fortunately we have a back-up in the form of our own local competition called the, FRONT OF HOUSE. For several years Cobham has run this competition that focuses on floral displays and colourful front gardens, those houses that abut the roadside focus on using hanging baskets or flower troughs, whereas others with small front gardens decorate borders and arrange colourful arrangements in all sorts of containers. The competition starts in April and continues through to October but it is open to the whole community therefore the pubs enter as well as the Community shop, the station, village halls and the Almshouse. Judging takes place in July when an R.H.S. qualified judge visits the Parish and awards points for the display presented by the competitors. This year there was quite a focus on recycling with magnificent displays on bicycles, wheelbarrows and greengrocers carts to name just a few! Trophies, certificates and vouchers are given as prizes and free membership of course to Cobham Gardeners Club who award the recipients at their Autumn Show.

This local competition helps to make visitors and speeding through traffic aware that this is a working village where people live and care for the place in which they live. We hope that by doing so that motorists and cyclists don't just use it as a "rat run" but slow down to admire the prettiest of Kent villages. Therefore to enhance the Parish more there are colourful flower troughs along the paths between the pillars, on the chicanes and edges of roads, in front of the station, pubs and shops. This year, following the national example the grassy banks were seeded with wild flowers that gave a brilliant show throughout the summer. Now of course you can see the results of our GREEN CANOPY with all three cherry trees in full bloom on the banks.

The Britain in Bloom inspectors, apart from overall impression, look for maintenance of planted areas and the quality of plants (most of ours were donations from villagers). They focus on the pride taken in the Parish as to environmental management, cleanliness, litter control and general maintenance of grass areas, signage and display boards.

We were asked to minimize our use of plastic and in Cobham's case the forty homemade wooden troughs (incidentally made by a resident of Cobham College) were much admired and earnt us extra points , so thank you Olly .

So what did the inspectors say as they awarded us the trophy and the title of BEST VILLAGE IN THE S.&S.E REGION?

"Clearly there is evidence of commitment, enthusiasm and pride shown by the residents and volunteers. December—Winter frost

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need work to keep you warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Check your winter protection and if you have a greenhouse make sure the heater is working. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning.

Top 10 jobs this month

- I Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- 2 Check that greenhouse heaters are working
- 3 Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing
- 4 Prune open-grown apples and pears (not those trained against walls)
- 5 Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 6 Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts, root crops
- 7 Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- 8 Take hardwood cuttings
- 9 Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10 Reduce watering of houseplants


