A latter from the David Conor Aluger Davie

A letter from the Revd. Canon Alyson Davie

How do you cope with the unforeseen?

There is an old saying that goes 'If you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans.' This saying comes to mind if you read the accounts of the birth of Jesus in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. In these accounts we find that the plans that Jesus' parents, Mary and Joseph had for their lives were constantly disrupted as unexpected things happened to them.

At the start of these accounts, we have Mary and Joseph engaged to be married and planning their new life together in Nazareth. However, Mary then gets visited by an angel, who informs her that she is going to become pregnant with the Son of God before being married to Joseph. This then occurs. As a result, Joseph is faced with the challenge of accepting (a) that Mary's story is true and (b) that the baby Mary is carrying is going to be God's Son and not his.

After a further visit from an angel (this time in a dream) Joseph accepts the situation and he and Mary await the new arrival. They then must unexpectedly make the journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem to comply with a Roman census and when they get to Bethlehem there's no guest accommodation available, so Mary has to give birth in the place where the animals are kept and lay Jesus in an animal feeding trough.

Mary, Joseph, and Jesus then start their family life together in Bethlehem, but some two years later they have to flee as refugees to Egypt because Herod, the Jewish king at the time, wants to kill Jesus who he sees as a threat to his rule. Eventually when Herod died, they return to Nazareth.

What is important to note, however, is that the accounts are crystal clear that although what took place did not happen according to Mary and Joseph's plans, they did happen exactly as God had planned and had announced in advance through the Old Testament prophets. God is in charge and what happens fulfils his good purposes for Mary and Joseph, for the salvation of humanity, and for the renewal of the whole of creation.

This is good news for us today because it reminds us that what happens to us is also a result of God's good plans for us and for the whole world.

Over the past few years, the plans of all of us have been disrupted because of the impact of Covid 19. Last year we saw the unforeseen invasion of Ukraine, which has led to the continuing fighting in that country, millions of Ukrainians having to unexpectedly leave their homes. Then all this means a huge jump in the cost of energy and an acute cost of living crisis in this country. This year we saw the attack by Hamas on southern Israel and the subsequent response by the Israel Defence Force, with a resultant rise in ethnic tensions around the world and the continuing threat that the conflict will spread. None of this was what we were looking for or what we had planned, but just as happened to the Holy Family in the Christmas story, it was not unexpected by God. Cont'd on page 5

He has always known it would happen and he will make it work out for our good if (like Joseph and Mary) we accept that he knows what he is doing and seek his help and guidance for our lives. In Luke, Mary says to God 'let it be to me according to your word.' This Christmas we need to learn to imitate her example. C S Lewis once wrote that with God 'there are no accidents.' The message for us this Christmas and for the year to come is simple.

Whatever happens, God knows what he is doing and it is upon that truth that we can trust our lives.

ST MARY'S CHURCH ROOM, SOLE STREET

I thought I would take this opportunity to update the community of what is happening to St Mary's Room, Tin Tabernacle in Sole Street.

For over 10 years the Local Fundraising Group (LFG) have worked determinedly in raising funds to restore the building. The Chair, Su Rowe and the committee have been faithfully and tirelessly, working year in and year out. To Su and the committee, the Parochial Church Council (PCC), the clergy, and the Diocese would like to say a BIG THANK YOU for all you have done. We would not be in the position of starting work on the building if it wasn't for this group. Back in early summer we received great news of a \pounds 150 thousand grant from The Lower Thames Crossing. This grant has now provided the opportunity to start work but there is still a lot to be done. As the building belongs to the Diocese, who gives the local church full responsibility, any alterations or work undertaken must be with the permission of the PCC. The PCC decided to set up a special Task Group comprising of 3 members from each of the following groups – The PCC, Parish Council, and the Local Fundraising group.

The sole purpose of this Task group is to focus on the work to be done and for the PCC to consider and agree on recommendations from this group. This releases the Fundraising group to concentrate and focus on fundraising which is integral for the building to be completed. A job they have done so well. By the time you read this a new architect and Project Manger will have been appointed. With God's Blessing we will be starting work hopefully by mid Spring or sooner. May I say a big thank you to all who have and are still supporting this work. We could not have done this without you. Blessings

However the order of the day is the members' vote on the Federation's Resolutions Shortlist for 2023:

Dental Health Matters as there is a chronic shortage of NHS dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result, we call on the Government to increase investment in training & retaining dentists and review current inadequate NHS contracts to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist.

Impacts of Poor Housing Conditions which can have a deleterious effect on health, safety & quality of life can disproportionately affect most vulnerable groups. We call on the Government to boost housing standards & regulations, increase funding for housing regulations, supply of affordable secure housing and strengthen collaboration with local authorities, housing associations & other relevant stakeholders to develop strategies that address local housing.

Say 'No' to Gambling Advertising: Harm caused by excessive gambling is a global problem. Some countries are already addressing this by banning advertising. NFWI calls on members, the Government, regulators, NHS, educationalists and gambling charities to work together towards achieving complete ban on gambling advertising. This will reduce gambling harm, save NHS money, protect family relationships, decrease number of suicides around 400 p.a.

Improving Outcomes for Women in Criminal Justice System is urgent need to radically reform decision making in respect of women in criminal justice system, in particular pregnant women and women with children. We urge cross government collaboration to deliver on 2018 female offender strategy by setting goals, robust governance & performance measures to reduce number of women who committed non-violent offences from being imprisoned.

North Kent Embroiderers

Hello Everyone,

In October we thoroughly enjoyed a talk by Dr Susan Kay-Williams CEO of the Royal School of Needlework <u>https://royal-needlework.org.uk/</u> Her talk was about the development of blackwork which is a form of embroidery usually worked in black thread on a white background, but Susan also gave us a lot of background information about the RSN. She told us how their studio was honoured to have been



commissioned to produce nine pieces of embroidery for the coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. These were the King's Robe of State, the Queen's Robe of Estate, the Anointing Screen, the Stole Royal and Girdle, the Chairs of Estate and the Throne Chairs. The RSN teaches all its students to work in the same way so that in times of pressure one embroiderer can take over from another and stitch in exactly the same way. The back of work is always finished neatly!

The history of Blackwork goes back to medieval times when both men and women did embroidery. Catherine of Aragon embroidered King Henry VIII's under linens but men would have worked on his over garments. In Elizabethan times, black and white were 'power colours' and blackwork on clothing was extremely popular as a result.

By the 1950's the RSN linked blackwork with goldwork to produce stunning images and more recently, blackwork has become less about pattern and more about using the technique to produce light and shade on pictorial pieces.

We have also been working hard to make stars for a charity Christmas tree project. As you can see from the picture, we have been working to a

colour scheme of red, silver and gold in the hope that we can create a beautiful festive display.

Our latest postcard challenge was called 'Fruit and Vegetables'. We had a good display of these which were eagerly swapped among our members who had taken part.

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

If only I was as knowledgeable as author Ronald Blythe (1922 – 2023) who also wrote an entertaining and informed weekly Wormingford diaries article in the Church Times. I often wonder what I might write just once a month. An old Country Life magazine gave me a thought with an article on the great Saxon church tower at Earls Barton in Northamptonshire. Built in AD 970 Christopher Winn in his book "I Never Knew That About England's Country Churches" (published in 2014) describes it as "the loveliest tower in England".

So old and superb is the Earls Barton church tower that it also features in the "Shell Guide to English Parish Churches" (1993) and "England's Thousand Best Churches " by Simon Jenkins (1999) which I never travel without. But Simon Jenkins never mentions bells and having been loaned "Towers and Bells of Britain" by Ernest Morris (1955) I now know that they have a ring of 8 bells. Knowing little of Northamptonshire how exciting it would be to get there and have a ring.

Mr. Morris's book includes chapters on West Towers, Twin Towers, Spires, Round Towers, Leaning Towers and Detached Towers. What a variety of towers for ringers to climb and each housing its own particular ring of bells which Mr. Morris describes. Rings of bells are very varied being of different weights and of various numbers of bells, usually 6 or 8, some of 10 and grand rings of 12 bells. Some go easily and some are tricky to ring and hard work. The lengths of the bell ropes vary too depending on the location of the bells and the ringers in the tower. All these variables are part of the challenge of ringing.

In Cobham we are fortunate with a good ring of 6 bells hung on a firm metal frame. There is a reasonable length of rope and we stand evenly spaced in a circle up in the ringing room so by eye and ear we can co-ordinate our striking (sounding of the individual bells in the ever changing pattern of sound).

As my thoughts meander in Cobham College our roof is being renewed and today, after plenty of rain, the sun is shining on the roofers. I must get out too before Storm Ciarán arrives and then in due time another Christmas. Happy Christmas from the Cobham bell ringers.

BRITAIN in BLOOM—Rosemary Dymond

Cobham village took part once again in this competition which judges small and large villages, towns and Boroughs across the south and southeast of England as far as Wiltshire. The village looked really attractive throughout the Spring and Summer based on the theme of Raspberry Ripple together with the most amazing growth of the wild flower banks and their display of cornflowers, daisies and poppies to name just 3 of the 12 varieties of wildflowers that were growing there, in fact the judge made a special comment on their attraction to insects and it gained us extra points. Last year we gained 79 points out of 100 and this year 80 but that still gave us a silver gilt award, in fact we needed 85 or higher to achieve gold. Last year our points gained us first place and a trophy but this year we were beaten into second place by Coldred village near Shepherdswell in the Dover area which only has 173 residents which is about a third of our population. So next year there needs to be more community involvement to brighten up areas in our community areas and more along the Street, though it has to be said that the College received a glowing report about their display and allotments and the community value of their produce. So clean the tools over winter and let's set to for next year's Front of House and Britain in Bloom competitions.

Winter frost

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need to work hard to keep warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Check your winter protection and if you have a greenhouse make sure the heater is working. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning.

Top 10 jobs this month

- I Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- 2 Check that greenhouse heaters are working
- 3 Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing
- 4 Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls)
- 5 Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding

6 Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root crops

- 7 Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- 8 Take hardwood cuttings
- 9 Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10 Reduce watering of houseplants

COBHAM AND LUDDESDOWN WI

Following our August break, at our September 6th meeting we were treated to a fascinating talk by one of our members, Sue Cameron, with



the intriguing title 'The Magic of the Pyjama Fairies'. Standing behind her ironing board and with a number of colourful garments behind her, Sue proceeded to tell us all about the charity for which she volunteers. 'The Pyjama Fairies' was set up by two young mothers in 2015 and is the only UK charity making pyjamas and surgical gowns specially designed for babies and children up to the age of 16, who are having surgery or associated medical tests in hospital. There are strict rules about the pyjamas, which can contain no metal and which have to be made using colourful and age-appropriate fabrics. The fabric designs tend to be gender-specific and are one hundred per cent cotton. There are lots of health and safety considerations and the donors remain completely anonymous. There are 300 'fairies' making about 4,000 garments a year and supplying 150 hospitals.

Our October 4th meeting was preceded by a Ploughman's Lunch – always popular with our members, followed by our annual craft 'make', which this year introduced members to the craft of 'quilling', which comprises curling up or shaping narrow strips of coloured paper and sticking them onto card to create a picture. The November meeting was our Annual Autumn Show, where all of our talented members get the chance to display their art and craft skills and hope to win an award, or even a first, second or third place or a 'highly commended' for their work over the past year. We were delighted by the number of entries in the craft classes - over double the number entered in last year's show. Our judge, Mrs Jenny Way, had the difficult task of assessing the entries and had nothing but praise for the quality and skills on display. The Dorothy Kemp Trophy for highest overall points went to Kaye Wren. In second place was Kerry Smith and the 'Judge's Choice' award went to Anne Tobutt. Although there were fewer art entries this year, the quality was still very high, and our member's voted Sue Cameron's Canadian landscape painting as their favourite. Sue received the Irene Brierly Trophy. Jenny Brooker received the award for members' favourite painted greetings card and Liz Hulf also won with her amusing 'Celebration' photograph.

The story of 'Silent Night'

This much-loved carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as *Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht* on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved world-wide; and the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.
