



### A letter from the Vicar-Rev'd Pam Davies

Dear friends,

Has anyone asked you if you are ready for Christmas yet? If not, they probably will soon. It's one of those questions that people ask at this time of year. We perhaps ask the question ourselves. It's the sort of question that's often asked when someone isn't quite sure what to say. It's a kind of conversation gap filler. But what does the question really mean?

Probably even the people who are asking the question don't really know what they mean. It could be a question about shopping for gifts, it could be a question about buying in food for Christmas Day, Boxing Day or some other family get together, it could be a question about decorating the house for Christmas – inside or outside, it could be a question about getting cards written and posted. It's probably generally meant to be a question that's a little about all of these things.

But as we think about Advent and preparing for Christmas, what would we understand the question 'Are you ready for Christmas?' to mean? What should we understand the question to mean? Well, I think that in Advent we are supposed to be thinking about being 'ready' for two different things.

Firstly, we should be preparing ourselves for Christmas. I think that this means thinking about our relationship with God, thinking about our need for a Saviour, thinking about God's love for us and his gift to us, thinking about who Jesus is and what he means to us. Maybe being ready for Christmas is about our recognition of our separation from God without Jesus and a willingness to accept him once again, to welcome him into our lives once again and to worship him once again.

Secondly, we should be thinking about, and preparing ourselves for, Christ's Second Coming. Our word Advent is derived from the Latin word *Adventus*, which is a translation of the Greek word *Parousia* which refers to the Second Coming. So how can we prepare ourselves for Christ's second coming?

Well, part of this would probably be in the same way that we might prepare for Christmas – thinking about our relationship with God, thinking about our need for a Saviour, thinking about God's love for us and his gift to us, thinking about who Jesus is and what he means to us; but also, I think it means trying to live lives that are worthy of disciples, followers of Christ. We will never really achieve this, but we should be thinking about what this means and we should be trying. I hope that you are not overwhelmed by Christmas preparations. I hope that you have a good Advent. I hope that the next time someone says to you 'Are you ready for Christmas?' you think a bit about being ready to welcome Jesus, both in terms of this season and in terms of our relationship with him on into eternity.

So as Christmas approaches yet again, we at Cobham, Luddesdowne, Meopham and Nurstead churches will be retelling the story of Jesus' birth in our Christingle, Carol, and Crib services and other services. The story takes us beyond the baby Jesus to remind us how desperately we need God and how extravagantly God loves this world.

Do join us as we rejoice at Jesus' birth and embrace him in our lives as the most wonderful and life changing gift that one can ever receive. Jesus is a free gift from God but it will take you until eternity to unwrap its treasures.

May God bless you and your family this Christmas and in 2025. Your friend Rev Pam



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#### **BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley**



The Old Rectory and The Old Vicarage, from behind their gates, gaze across churchyards and for now the churches and their bells remain while the clergy proclaim the faith. In Oxfordshire at Wigginton the church dates from 1250 and stands on the site of a Roman temple and villa. The 1753 ring of 6 bells were rehung in 1998 on a new steel frame fitted below an historic wooden frame which had to remain. Today ringers climb the tower stone spiral stair and then descend the eight foot metal loft ladder to the lowered ringing room floor. Well done the local ringers in this elevated dungeon ringing a Coronation quarter peal in 2023 while today the Reverend Janet tends the flame in her four parishes.

At St. Kenelm's Church, Enstone the church guide describes a building from around 850A.D. with 13 centuries of history and 9 eras of building, rebuilding and changes. Legends about the murdered Saxon child King Kenelm abound and the 2018 striking mosaic reredos by Nicholas Mynheer links the lives of Christ and Kenelm. While we rang the six 1831 bells a Lady was arranging bucketfuls of flowers for a big Saturday Wedding and the Parochial Church Council leaflet stressed a monthly deficit of £1,108 which must be addressed.

The Ministry Team of 3 clergy look after the 7 parishes in the Cherwell Valley Benefice and we rang at Somerton. There were many memorials to the Fermor family who remained quietly Catholic through the religious upheavals of the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. Today bats are happy in the church and with long ropes we rang the bells from the ground floor.

Finally, to Steeple Aston where they are awaiting a new Rector for their 3 parish Benefice. The famed Steeple Aston Cope (1310 - 1340) is now cared for at the Victoria and Albert Museum. In the Lady Chapel the monument to the haughty Georgian Sir Francis Page, 'the hanging judge', with his reclining relict Lady Page, died 1730, looks down on the tables for today's after Service coffee. Up in the tower gallery we rang the 8 bells. The obviously able band had a silver cup for their ringing. In May 2023 they had rung a 3 hour peal on the eve of the Coronation, had general ringing on Coronation Day, and rang a quarter peal the next day for the Sunday service. As at Cobham very many countrywide rang for crowned King Charles III and Queen Camilla.

The glorious Church of England churches endure and their bells remain. Congregations and ringers fade and need to be renewed. Meanwhile the Warwickshire River Avon and the Oxfordshire River Cherwell flow on. Happy Christmas.

### REMEMBER THEM

Over 80 villagers and friends gathered on the Memorial Green in Cobham on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November to remember the fallen of our village. Many of the gathered were relatives of the men and women whose names were read out from the memorials engravings, the poignancy of that reminder was felt by all who attended the service .Two sixth form students from Cobham Hall read John McCrae's poem In Flanders Fields "If ye break faith with us who die we shall not sleep, though poppies grow in Flanders fields ". Two young brothers from Cobham Primary School then read a quite emotional poem written by a nine year old "I am only a child and it's hard to explain the feelings I have as I sit in the rain and think of the men who went off to war knowing they would not come home anymore ......" Thank you children and students for reading with such earnestness and empathy. The sun continued to shine in the still Autumn air, the startlingly bright coloured trees and the magnificent view across the Downs that faced the memorial cross painted a very different landscape to that endured by the fallen. As the bugler played the Last Post copper leaves fell silently on the heads bowed below and all reflected on the names of those in our village who never came back. The Chairman of Cobham Parish Council brought the service to an end by thanking everyone for their attendance and thanked especially the team of cyclists who dressed in RBL cycling shirts had arrived breathlessly just before the service started having valiantly cycled strenuously up Cobhambury road, in fact they have always attended this occasion with their bikes and their presence was very much appreciated. ### **December** Winter frost

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need work hard to keep warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Check your winter protection and if you have a greenhouse make sure the heater is working. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning.

Top 10 jobs this month

- I Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- 2 Check that greenhouse heaters are working
- 3 Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing
- 4 Prune open-grown apples and pears (not those against walls)
- 5 Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 6 Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and root crops
- 7 Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- 8 Take hardwood cuttings
- 9 Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10 Reduce watering of houseplants

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### North Kent Embroiderers



Hello Everyone, Some of our group recently took part in a day school run by Roz and Judy, two sisters who can be found at Felterswww.woollyfelters.com The class was an introduction the art of needle felting and by the end of the day our members had produced the adorable little bears that you can see here. Despite a certain amount of finger pricking, everyone had a very enjoyable time.

A different kind of

technique was described by Christine Seymour-Godwin who came to talk to us about the art of needle weaving with a painted silk background. Christine told us how as a child she had been fascinated by watching her grandmother darning, stitching backwards and forwards and then weaving up and down to mend a worn hole in a garment.

She said that this memory together with her love of trees had led her to her current embroidery style. Christine explained how she cuts the weft (left to right) threads of a piece of fabric, usually linen, scrim or hessian and draws them back to leave a gap in the fabric with only the warp (top to bottom) threads remaining intact. She then uses a variety of different wools, silks and other fibres to embroider highly textured scenes of trees and woodland.

The finished pieces are beautiful in themselves but they are usually backed by a piece of silk fabric which Christine has painted and as you can see here, the finished result is stunning.





Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the 3rd century in the Greek village of Patara, on what is today the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he suffered in prison with other bishops under the emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians.

One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings over our mantelpieces today. There was a poor family with three daughters who needed dowries if they were to marry, and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window – thus saving the girls from a life of misery. The bags of gold landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out stockings – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols of St Nicholas.
