### Bell Ringing by Peter Hartley


There are 230 ringing towers (near enough) in Kent and John Keeler had conducted full three hour peals in all bar six. Cobham was one of the six so he gathered five other expert ringers and on Thursday morning 10<sup>th</sup> November they did ring their peal. For the record they rang 5,040 changes of seven Surprise Minor methods being 720 changes of each of London, Westminster, Durham, Bourne, Beverley, Norwich and Cambridge which took them 3 hours and 1 minute. It means little to me too but 1 do know it is impressive. Now they have five towers to go.

In the band was Alan Regin who is Steward of the Rolls of Honour of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers and the Rolls, in alphabetical order of ringers killed in war, are kept in St. Paul's Cathedral. The band dedicated their peal to 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant William Wakely Pye, 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion of the Royal West Kent Regiment, of Jeskyns who was a Cobham ringer and was killed in the Great War.

William Wakely Pye is among the 20,598 dead remembered on the Loos Memorial in France who have no known grave. But his death is not forgotten for his name is recorded in the Rolls of Honour in St. Paul's and Canterbury Cathedrals and on the Memorials designed by Sir Herbert Baker of Owletts in Loos and the War Memorial in Cobham village as well as in the Church. On 14<sup>th</sup> October 2015, being the exact Centenary of the Death of William Wakely Pye we did ring a Quarter Peal in Cobham in his honour. Always remembered.

After their ringing I found John Keeler and his band, quite rightly, in the Leather Bottle and I thanked them for their thoughtful dedication of their splendid peal. Then for Remembrance Sunday Byron Aldous and Christian Antrobus half-muffled our bells. So, as is customary, we rang half-muffled rounds as the haunting background sound while prayers are said and wreaths laid at the village War Memorial and for the Service of Remembrance in the Church.

The next day Monday 14th November, with muffles removed, we rang a Quarter Peal in celebration of the 74<sup>th</sup> Birthday of King Charles III and the first birthday of His Majesty as Sovereign. Then we just had to toast The King in the Darnley Arms. Another year hoves into view, so Happy New Year to all for Coronation Year.

Enjoy the fresh air, on dry sunny days, and check your winter protection, stakes, ties and supports are still working after any severe weather. Also put out food for birds and leave some garden areas uncut, a little longer, to provide shelter for wildlife in your garden.

### RHS - Top 10 jobs this month

- I Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2 Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- 3 Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4 Disperse worm casts in lawns
- 5 Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying
- 6 Prune apple and pear trees
- 7 Start forcing rhubarb
- 8 Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9 Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10 Make a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect against peach leaf curl



The Bishop of Rochester, in consultation with the Archdeacon of Rochester and the Rector of Meopham with Nurstead, is pleased to announce that The Revd Canon Alyson Elizabeth Davie is also to be licensed as Priest-in-Charge of the benefice of Cobham with Luddesdowne and Dode. This is alongside her role as Rector of the benefice of Meopham with Nurstead. # Gardening for a Wilder Kent – Hedgehogs

European Hedgehog is the species in the UK of the prickly night time visitor which we see in cute pictures on ceramics and textiles, but hedgehogs are a rapidly declining species. We are so lucky when we see them or their signs here and lots of us try to support them in their fight for survival.

We are surrounded by the woodlands, grasslands, the park and the thurchyard that are important habitats but our gardens are part of the
arge range they need if they are living here as they travel between I and
om per night. We can help in several ways:
☐ Connect gardens
☐ Provide food by plants for insects and leaving some long grass
☐ Stop use of pesticides and poisons especially slug pellets
☐ Provide log piles and leaf pile for habitat
$\Box$ Be aware of dangers: strimming, bonfires, driving through the village $a$

You may be thinking that because you don't see hedgehogs in the garden they do not visit but as they are nocturnal you may have missed their visit. Keep a look out for their little tell-tale deposits, smaller and more formed than a fox dirt but bigger than a mouse dropping. If you think you have visiting hedgehogs you may wish to leave out some food and water and buy or construct a hedgehog house to be placed in a secluded shady corner. The hedgehogs' favourite is cat food, preferably meat and kitten biscuits but never milk. The feeding station must be made cat and fox proof. This can be achieved by using an upturned or lidded plastic box with a doorway the size of a CD, weighted, with a brick at the entrance leaving just enough room for a hedgehog. Leave the food inside and hope that it gets eaten.

Because of their decline, if you see a hedgehog there are organisations that want to know. Log your sightings whether the hedgehog is alive or dead on the Big Hedgehog Map at bighedgehogmap.org where you will find the details of Hedgehog Street which is a project to promote the development of the connectivity of gardens for hedgehogs. Please take a look.

### The man who made the first-ever vaccine. By Tim Lenton

Two hundred years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> January 1823, Edward Jenner, the British physician and immunologist who created the first vaccine (for smallpox), died of a stroke.

He was the son of a Gloucestershire clergyman and the brother of another – who brought him up when his father died. He was also a violinist, a poet and a naturalist, but he chose medicine and became the pupil of a distinguished surgeon, John Hunter, at St George's Hospital in London. Hunter also had wide interests, and the two kept in touch for many years.

Jenner, a committed and sincere Christian, married a near neighbour, Catharine Kingscote, in 1788. He was described as amiable and quiet, but his work in creating a smallpox vaccine was said to have saved more lives than any other man on earth, though his treatment in making inoculations using cowpox lesions, initially from a dairymaid in 1796, was laughed at by some to start with.

The word 'vaccination' (relating to cows) stems from this experiment. Previous smallpox inoculation attempts were known as variolation and were both less successful and dangerous to health. Jenner himself had received this treatment as a child.

Jenner was a member of the Royal Society, primarily because of his work as a naturalist. He published valuable observations and interpretations on, for instance, the life of the cuckoo, which was little understood at the time.

But in the end, he gave so much time to vaccination work that his personal affairs suffered badly, though he was voted a total of £30,000 by Parliament.

His wife died of tuberculosis in 1815, after which he retired from public life. In 1980 the World Health Organisation said that smallpox had finally been eradicated from the world, though a few lab samples were kept.



### The Coming of the Magi

'Where is the One who has been born King of the Jews? We saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him.' So Matthew tells of the coming of the Magi, or Wise Men, to the baby Jesus. Today we remember it on Epiphany, on 6<sup>th</sup> January. Did they come from Arabia Felix – nowadays southern Arabia? How many came? No one knows, but by the 6<sup>th</sup> century they were named Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. Why gold, frankincense and myrrh? Gold stands for kingship: Jesus was King of the Jews. Frankincense stands for divinity; Jesus was to be worshipped. Myrrh stands for death and burial; Jesus would become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi wanted to worship Jesus; Herod wanted to kill Him. But the Jewish leaders who knew about the prophecy of a Messiah born in Bethlehem did not even bother to visit to Bethlehem. And it is only six miles from Jerusalem!
