<u>Do you remember the 'Millennium Bug'?</u>

It was 25 years ago, on 1^{st} January 2000, that the calendar switched over to the year 2000, with no major computer problems from the Y2K "Millennium Bug".

The Y2K bug was a computer flaw involving software and hardware that might have caused problems when dealing with dates beyond 31st December, 1999. This was because, for storage reasons, there had been a practice of using two figures for dates – for instance 78 instead of 1978. It was therefore feared that 00 for 2000 might be interpreted as 1900, with chaos resulting in the power industry, transportation or anywhere that computers were critical.

When this potential problem was recognised – surprisingly late, in the mid-1990s – a great deal of money was poured into preventing it from happening, particularly by countries like the USA and Australia, as well as the UK.

Other countries, such as Russia, South Korea and Italy, spent almost nothing on the problem. Ironically, they suffered no more in the end than those who invested many millions, because it turned out that there were very few difficulties.

A nuclear energy facility in Japan experienced failure in its radiation equipment, but backup facilities ensured there was no danger. Missile launches were detected in Russia and attributed to the Y2K bug, but the launches had been planned as part of Russia's conflict in Chechnya.

Because of the lack of disastrous outcomes, many people dismissed the Y2K bug as a hoax or an end-of-the-world cult. A small number of fundamentalist Christians had been interpreting the whole issue as apocalyptic, involving the breakdown of society, the Last Days and the subsequent Second Coming.

Similar computer problems had been predicted for other years, for similar but obviously not identical reasons. They include 1975, 1999, 2010, 2022 and - wait for it - 2038.

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- Disperse worm casts in lawns
- Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- Prune apple and pear trees
- Start forcing rhubarb
- Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- Make a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect against peach leaf curl

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

In the centuries old embrace of Cobham College the future is yet to come, the present is here and the past is known. Glancing back into the recent past and the autumn St. Margaret's, Rochester arranged a day's ringing down Thanet way. We began by the grey cold looking North Sea at Westgate-on-Sea. The church was consecrated in 1884 but the bells only arrived in 1975 having come from Holy Cross, Canterbury. Four of the bells were cast by Joseph Hatch in the early 17th century who also cast four of our Cobham bells.

In the parish church at Birchington past the grave of Dante Gabriel Rossetti it was a climb up the vertical ladder behind the organ into the ringing room for a ring on their eight bells. All Saints, Whitstable was rebuilt in 1875 and has a chancel enhanced by the work of Omar Ramsden. After a ring it was good to walk along the seafront with an ice cream and gaze at the still active oyster beds.

In 1310 the parish of Herne was carved out of the vast parish of Reculver and Nicholas Ridley was a vicar. There is a brass inscription to Samuel Weller May and he was a friend of Charles Dickens who gave the Christian names to one of his immortal characters. The bells were augmented to eight in 2011. The church at Hernhill looks across the village green and we rang the eight bells which were rehung in 1997. As the light faded an enjoyable ringing day came to an end.

In November at Cobham we rang a 45 minute quarter peal of Plain Bob Doubles and Grandsire Doubles to send our best wishes to friend and fellow ringer Nigel Pagram. Our ringing was also to thank all who helped achieve the restoration of our bells thirty years ago and as part of the Kent County Association of Change Ringers, Rochester District, annual November Quarter Peal Month.

Ringing is an enjoyable hobby and a service to the church. It involves skill, concentration and team work to ring the required changes in the order in which the bells ring out in accordance with the various methods (patterns/tunes) being rung. If only world affairs could be ordered and conducted with a similar spirit of harmony and co-operation. Whatever may come to pass in 2025 the toast remains a Happy New Year.


Hello Everyone,





Word Search - Gifts of the Wise Men

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? One Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote the much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first Gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had!
