Church News - CofE attendance rises for fourth year

Attendance at C of E churches grew for the fourth year in a row last year. The overall number of regular worshippers across the Church of England's congregations grew to 1.02 million in 2024, a rise of 1.2 per cent, according to an early snapshot of the annual Statistics for Mission findings.

It was the second year in a row in which the Church of England's 'worshipping community' – the combined number of regular members of local congregations – has stood above a million since the Covid-19 pandemic. The numbers in the pews on a typical Sunday was up by a further 1.5 per cent to 582,000 in 2024, extending rises over recent years.

And overall, the in-person attendance across the week edged upwards by 1.2 per cent in a year, and stood at just over 701,000 last year, according to the early figures. The increase was driven by a recovery in attendance by adults (over 16), among whom average Sunday attendance was up by 1.8 per cent, and weekly attendance rose by 1.5 per cent. While the overall figures show that in-person attendance has not fully reached pre-pandemic levels, the figures suggest it is moving closer to the pre-pandemic trend.

The preliminary snapshot of Statistics for Mission returns follows separate figures which show there has also been a sharp increase in traffic on the Church of England's church-finder website, AChurchNearYou.com. The number of page visits to AChurchNearYou.com jumped by 55 per cent last year to almost 200 million as people searched for their local congregation.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "The Church of England exists to share the good news of Jesus Christ. So it is encouraging to see further signs that more people are coming to faith in Jesus Christ and having their lives changed. "Although this is just a snapshot and we don't know the ages of those who have started attending church in the past year, other evidence suggests that many of these are young adults.

Debbie Clinton, the Church of England's Director for Vision and Strategy, said: "Our statistics are much more than numbers, each represents an individual. In 2024 we have heard and seen exciting stories of growth in parishes, in our estates and in post-industrial and coastal towns. "Nationally we aim to ensure that each young person has a flourishing children, youth and families' ministry within reach of them, we are seeing growth in the number of churches with more than 25 young people attending."

In the meantime, Summer we hope is progressing or at last arriving at least!! July is usually one of the hottest months of the year and a great time to sit out and enjoy your garden. Keep plants looking good by regularly dead-heading, and you'll enjoy a longer display of blooms. Make sure you keep new plants well-watered, using grey water where possible, and hoe off weeds, which thrive in the sunshine. Top 10 RHS jobs this month

- I. Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt
- 2. Care for houseplant while on holiday
- 3. Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise
- 4. Deadhead bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, to ensure continuous flowering
- 5. Pick courgettes before they become marrows
- 6.Treat apple scab
- 7. Clear algae, blanket weed and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up
- 8. Order catalogues for next year's spring-flowering bulbs
- 9. Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if not given a spring feed
- 10. Harvest apricots, peaches, and nectarines

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

May is a month when bell ringers think of touring other church towers. On the 10^{th} , a day of unbroken sunshine, I was lucky enough to be driven through white froths of May blossom and cow-parsley and villages of fluttering flags and bunting in celebration of the 80th Anniversary of VE Day.

We ringers gathered at Lympne where the massive Norman church tower now has 8 bells augmented in 2015 from the 6 when I last rang here twenty years ago. Having rung I descended the iron spiral stairs to sit in the churchyard on a fine new teak seat gazing out across the vast view of Romney Marsh and the glittering English Channel beyond. A gentleman was watering sunflowers and we talked. I learnt his daughter Megan loved sunflowers and elephants which were etched on her seat which I was enjoying. Megan had died of an aggressive leukaemia aged 29 and now I could thank her father for such a lovely memorial seat which he and his wife had commissioned. May the sunflowers soar. I also heard that the adjacent mediaeval castle is now a visitor attraction and that the Canadian lady owner has now left this Country as non-dom tax rules change.

Newchurch looked changeless and at the church it was a ground floor ring so we had long ropes to control the 6 bells high up above us in the tower. An exhibition in the church told of different times. Being on the Marsh the people suffered much from marsh fever. However they also benefited from the smuggling trade. We had just remembered 80 years ago and the end of yet another war. In that Second World War the village had a Landing Ground from where Spitfires would take off and try 'tipping doodlebugs'.

On the 8th May 1945 all the church bells rang out. In the churches on our tour we could see that it had been arranged that ringers were to gather and ring the bells on the 8th May 2025. At our home tower of Cobham all our ringers made a point of coming up the tower and ringing as part of our own village VE Day Celebrations.

A lunchtime sandwich was enjoyed in New Romney which was the lead of the original five Cinque Ports founded by William the Conqueror. Our next church was just across the road.



Others spoke of being shy or awkward and that they never thought they could ever get up on stage - yet every one of them was a star performer that night and proof that with the encouragement and dedication of the fabulous volunteers coaching them, the shyest teenager can one day be making a speech in front of hundreds of people - or singing their heart out on stage. The older GYGs looked and spoke like young professionals and indeed they sang alongside real professionals, who had started out at GYG. Performers were in their teens - and some even younger "mini GYG's" who got some of the biggest applause.

There is a serious ending to this article. Although it's hard to believe, the funding stream for this vital institution for the young people of Gravesend runs out this year. So without some serious financial help to keep GYG afloat it could be the end. This would be too much of a disaster for all the children and families involved to even contemplate, but it's a real possibility unless the people of Gravesham fight for GYG - and support them financially.
