A letter from the Vicar

My Dear Friends,

June is bustin' out all over All over the meadow and the hill Buds're bustin' outa bushes And the rompin' river pushes Ev'ry little wheel that wheels beside the mill

A song taken from the film 'Carousel' and it always reminds me of summer. A time when we see the garden filled with colour and brightness. We look forward to being outside enjoying (we hope) good weather. Summer is very often a time when we take holidays of rest, things start to feel much more easier to deal with and life just seems that little bit brighter.

Summer can also show up those parts of our homes which may need a fresh lick of paint , repair or a full renovation of an area which is now starting to look well sad for itself.

This summer we hope to see the refurbishment of Saint Mary's Room Sole St. It has been a hard long road for many faithful people over the past 12 years to raise funds for this to happen. It's not been without its hiccups, upsets, and disagreements but perseverance and faith have got them to this point in time.

Perseverance is something that is everyone's to gain but many people do not want to work for it. After all, wouldn't it be great if we could all be strong and fearless in the face of adversity and enduring hardship came natural to us. But this is not how life works. Perseverance has to be earned and built through many trials and tough decisions. And this is the same for our faith. The testing of our faith may not be pleasant, but it produces an important fruit, the ability to stand stronger the next time we are tested, so how can this be?

First of all, when our faith is tested, we realise just how dependent we are upon God. We've come to the end of our rope, and we come to accept there's nothing we can do to save ourselves. If life was always perfect and painless than we would never know how powerful the grace of God is. It is by trials that we come to understand that we are weak and our strength comes from Christ, who will never fail us and so, as we face more trials in the future. We can be confident that just as God helped us before He will help us again.

The testing of our faith also gives us wisdom. The first time we encounter difficulty, it can be easy to feel overwhelmed. Everything is uncertain I'm not sure which choices to make or how to react in the best way. As it turns out much of life is trial and error. But the lessons we learned along the way aren't just a coincidence. On the contrary, God's plan for all our lives is divinely orchestrated. He knows exactly what we need to learn and how we need to learn it.

So when we find ourselves struggling with faith in a situation, we can draw upon the experiences we've already faced and what God has taught us in the past. Romans 5:3-4 says

'more than that we rejoice in our sufferings knowing that suffering produces perseverance and e perseverance produces character and character produces hope'.

Rejoicing in suffering sounds nearly impossible, but it is what we're called to do as followers of Christ. We can persevere with even greater strength then the rest of the world, because we have an advantage that they don't, faith in Jesus Christ. Even when this faith is tested and we find ourselves wrestling with doubt, we know that all our suffering creates perseverance as we go through life. All we have to do is

Hedgehogs in our Gardens

One balmy evening two years ago as I was sitting in my courtyard garden just as the sun was setting, enjoying a glass of chilled wine when I heard 'rustling' from behind me. Thinking it might be a rat, I froze! But, trundling along amongst the plants was a very healthy looking, big, fat

hedgehog, I was very relieved and also very excited!

How fantastic that we should have visiting hedgehogs in our gardens . I

immediately got a plate of cat food (I was already feeding a cat or two and some foxes) and placed it on the ground as close as I could to where he was and sat back down on my bench.

I watched him for about an hour as he munched the food and explored the garden. I was hooked!

When my sons asked me what I wanted for Christmas I had no hesitation in replying 'A Hedgehog House and a Wildlife Camera please'. I now have two houses hidden amongst the bushes for their hibernation.

Now, at least 2, maybe 3 visiting hogs come at the same time each evening, you could almost set your clocks by them. One definitely is returning each season as I can see from the camera footage that he has particular markings on one side of his body.

The plate has recently been replaced by a feeding station allowing the hogs to feed without having to share the food with visiting cats and foxes and I have photos of the fox and hedgehog almost feeding from the same plate at the same time but now I feed the foxes in a different area of the garden, so everything is happy!

I place the camera in different locations over a period of weeks and check the footage regularly on my computer, capturing the hogs travelling all over the garden, even negotiating our deep stone steps from the lawn as I added some wooden blocks to help make the steps shallower for them.

Last summer the camera captured still photographs and some video footage

of 2 hogs eating side by side, is it wishful thinking that we may hear the pitter patter of tiny hog feet sometime soon? Watch this space for the first baby our garden has places behind shrubs where there are piles of leaves in one place and piles of twigs in another where hedgehogs and other wildlife can stay secretly. BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

For an annual Spring outing ringing friends from Kent, Sussex and Hampshire gathered in the industrial heartland of the High Weald. However the iron industry of before the Armada to after Waterloo then moved up to the northern coalfields. So we were able to enjoy pretty villages in their hursts or groves with their churches and bells.

Our first hurst was Goudhurst with its 16th century ironmaster Culpeper family memorials in the church. The tower was rebuilt after being struck by lightning in 1637. We rang the 8 bells from the gallery with great views down into the church and out down the street and all across the slopes of the hill with long views of typical Kentish countryside. Lamberhurst is famous for its snowdrop churchyard and the three-decker pulpit and John Piper window. We rang their 6 bells.

Over the border into Sussex the 33 iron grave slabs in Wadhurst Church floor bear witness to the importance of the iron industry. The 124 feet church spire is covered in 5,400 cedar wood shingles and the bell ropes are 75 feet long. The bells were augmented to 8 in 1955. We were privileged to ring the bells for a 105 year old lady who loved the sound of the bells. Her funeral was in the Roman Catholic Church but, as she had requested, we rang as her coffin came across for burial in the churchyard of the parish church. Now she will hear the bells for evermore.

In the gallery of Ticehurst Church we rang the 6 bells cast in 1771 and rehung in 1950. Before leaving the fine mediaeval glass could be noted and on the 1964 wooden lectern carved by Robert Thompson of Yorkshire his signature mouse was spotted.

Back in Kent the church at Sandhurst stands outside the village commanding views across the Rother valley to Sussex. The gold and blue window of St. Michael is a treasure for the glass dates from about 1450. The 6 bells are an anticlockwise ring so it is essential to look <u>left</u> when commencing to ring.

It had been a good day ringing through the hursts amidst the myriad of new greens of the High Weald Spring countryside. The next day back ringing for the fortnightly Sunday morning Service on our familiar Cobham bells.

May Talk

The Society had another interesting and well attended talk by Caroline Halfpenny in May, about water in the garden and its importance for wildlife and our own mental wellbeing. Studies have proven the following -When we are near water, our mind enters a semi-medative state, known as 'drifting'.Drifting is a special form of attention, where we are still engaged with the world around us, but not focused on getting things done.

June - Summer arrives.

June 21 is the longest day of the year, and the extra light and warmth encourages the garden to put on an exuberant burst of growth. But this extra light and warmth also means weeds will sprout up from seemingly nowhere. Keep on top of them by hoeing regularly in dry conditions. Here's the RHS Top 10 lobs for this month.

- I Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds.
- 2 Be water-wise, especially in drought-affected areas.
- 3 Pinch out sideshoots on tomatoes.
- 4 Harvest lettuce, radish, other salads, and early potatoes
- 5 Position summer hanging baskets and containers outside
- 6 Mow lawns at least once a week
- 7 Plant out summer bedding
- 8 Stake tall or floppy plants
- 9 Prune many spring-flowering shrubs.
- 10 Shade greenhouses to keep them cool and prevent scorch

Erasmus, patron saint of sailors

Do you like messing about in boats? If so, then you'll have heard of St Elmo's Fire. It is the light that is sometimes seen on mastheads of boats after storms at sea. St Elmo is another name for St Erasmus, a fourth century Syrian bishop who was not afraid of violent storms. Legend has it that one day when Erasmus was preaching outside, a thunderbolt hit the ground right beside him. That might have distracted modern bishops, but not Erasmus – he just kept on preaching. His courage won him the respect of sailors, who made him their patron saint. Erasmus finally died during the Diocletian persecutions in 300AD, and his feast day is 2nd June.
