A letter from the Rev'd Pam Davies

My dear friends

If you work for a well-known organisation such as British Gas or BT or a High Street bank or even the local council and let it be known in the course of the conversation you will find that people are quick to tell you their opinion of the gas, telephone service, banks or councils. You rapidly build up a picture of your employer's public im-

I find the same thing happens with me on the Church of England (or the church in general). And what is the public image? Basically, that the church is always on about sin, and that only non-sinners are welcome. "Say a special prayer for me, vicar" said one person I meet from time to time. "Why" I asked, "Because I'm too bad to go to church, I'm too sinful" Why don't you join us one Sunday?' I ask another person. "Oh no" Is the reply "you could do without an old Sinner like me."

Faced with a world, (When not talking to a clergy person) that doesn't seem much concerned about sin. I find myself asking whether Christians are in fact unhealthily obsessed with it. Is there something morbid about our weekly recital of the Confession and of our "manifold sins and wickedness... the remembrance of (which) is grievous unto us and the burden of (which) is intolerable. A quote from the Book of Common Prayer.

Self-acceptance, self-affirmation, even self-assertion is much more to the modern taste than acknowledgement that we have done wrong and broken God's law. If people talk about guilt at all, they often mean guilty feelings, something subjective rather than objective. Even in Christian circles you hear people using expressions such as" feeling OK or not feeling OK" about something.

On this subject of sin, a modern Christian author has written: "nowadays the conviction of sin is widely misunderstood, secularists pity Christians whom they picture as people bowed to the ground under the enormous burden of self-condemnation, as those who go around all the time feeling guilty. Actually, of course, as anyone who has experience conversion knows, the Christian is the only person who does not go around all the time feeling guilty. For them, sin is a burden he can lay down: he can admit it, repent and be forgiven."

Christ alone has achieved the forgiveness of our sin and therefore it is only the Christian who can be free of guilt and guilty feelings while at the same time being honest about himself or herself. This was the virtual truth grasped by the penitent thief on the cross next to Jesus. He recognised the saving grace of Christ.

So, people who think the church is concerned about sin are right, and so it should be because God is. Where so many are wrong, however, is in supposing that Christians have achieved – or think they have achieved - perfection and that sinners are not welcome among their number. Perhaps we need to examine our consciences, individually and collectively, and ask ourselves whether we have mistakenly conveyed that impression.

I love the story of the vicar who put up a large sign outside his church 'THIS CHURCH IS FOR SINNERS ONLY' it caused a lot of offence among some of his congregation, but he was absolutely right, wasn't he?

Over the past couple of years we have been provided with some wonderful articles by the volunteers of the Kent Wildlife Trust.

Thankfully, The Shorne Wildlife Community Group will be sharing, with us, some of their articles which reflect the work they are doing to conserve our beautiful wildlife



Community Group

Our aim is to nurture, conserve and sustain wildlife in Shorne and our environment through collaboration and by promoting this message.

Take a walk in Great Crabbles Woods, Randall Woods, Starmore Woods, Court Lodge Woods, Shorne Country Park, Ashbank Woods (Woodlands Trust) or Cobham Woods (National Trust) and see how many English oaks you can see? Shorne's English oak trees are dotted all around our village: the commons, lanes, woods, private woodland gardens and field edges, many here are ancient or veteran. How lucky we are to have them here before we were born

Let's all try and protect these beautiful trees as much as we possibly can why?

One oak tree can support more wildlife biodiversity than ANY other native species in the UK; up to 2300 species are known to be associated with oak trees. Our two native oak trees in UK are the English oak or common oak and the Sessile oak.

A range of birds feed on oak trees, either looking for insects or acorns or a place to nest: Blue Tit and Great Tit, Nuthatches, Wood Pigeons, Woodpeckers, Magpies; Tree creepers and owls nest in its trunk. Squirrels build their drays in the oaks, bats roost in old woodpecker holes or under bark. Holes and crevices in the tree bark are perfect nesting spots for the dormouse.

As oak leaves fall to the ground in autumn, the leaves support biodiversity, feeding many insects as they rot down. Hedgehogs love oak leaves for their

It is said no other tree species in UK supports a greater diversity of life than an ancient oak. That is apart from them being so beautiful. Let us all preserve our oaks.

Betty Bicker-Robinson

We regret to announce the passing at age 97 of Mrs Betty Bicker-Robinson, who has lived in Round Street since 1948. She worked for many years on Mr Lawrence's farm and, after her first husband died, worked at Cobham Hall where eventually she became Head Cook. While in her eighties she did a sponsored tandem parachute jump from an aeroplane, raising £2,000 for the Ellenor Foundation.

Born at New Barn in 1926 she remembered well walk-

ing at 3 years old to Sunday School at Longfield Hill, together with the neighbours' children, and the hymns she learnt that she recalled into her nineties.

This exceptional memory has also been a help in recent times to the local amateur archaeologist, and thanks to him many of her memories can be found at http://shornewoodsarchaeology.co.uk/oral-history/blues-yarns under the heading 'Blue's Yarns ', as Blue was her family nickname. During the 2nd World War she spent a period in the Land Army in Gloucestershire where it was necessary to cycle 10 miles to work each morning, drive a Fordson tractor all day, then cycle 10 miles back. In recent years, her favourite pastime was to watch children playing on the promenade at Gravesend or watch shipping movements on the river, but always ready to chat about times gone by.

Hello Everyone,



At our meeting in March we welcomed Callisto Searle as our speaker. Callisto is an artist who lives locally but who went to China to live and to study Ancient Chinese Philosophy. Life for local people where she lived was very tough but the people were strong and resilient. Callisto told us how she became fascinated by the beautiful Suzhou embroidery done by the women. She


also explained how the women would sit together quietly on a bed and embroider insoles for the men to wear in their shoes when they went out to work. These were made from layers of fabric stitched together. A grid was drawn on by hand and then a cross stitch design added as you can see. The women would stitch motivational messages such as 'tread on a small (mean) person' in the shoes. The idea was to give the men strength and to remind them of the women and home they would be going back to.

On her return to the UK Callisto brought with her samples of this lovely work which she was happy to show us. The traditional colours are very bright and the designs are full of symbolism. How lovely for us to see these pieces and to hear the stories behind them. Thank you Callisto! BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

"Use it or lose it" and I am grateful to use the Kent County Council Mobile Library Service which comes to Cobham village every other Tuesday stopping opposite the Primary School between 10am and 10.40am. From the ever helpful Matt I have just enjoyed "Steeple Chasing: Around Britain by Church" by Peter Ross. "His stories are always a joy" as Ian Rankin remarks.

In bell ringing you may not wander but Mr Ross's church-crawling is a delight to be shared. He visits St. Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield, London's oldest parish church, which has been our family's wedding church. In St. Paul's Cathedral the author recalls the Blitz and I remember one unique moment standing alone in wonder in Wren's vast masterpiece.

St. Peter the Vincula in the Tower of London, the burial place of executed Queens Anne Boleyn and Katherine Howard, is visited by Peter Ross and my mind wanders to a cold, dark winter's night when after the Ceremony of the Keys the Tower had lost its daytime Disney feel and reverted to its ancient and threatening state prison atmosphere.

At Southwark Cathedral Peter Ross thinks of Charles Dickens in 1869 observing the ringing practice of the members of the Ancient Society of College Youths (founded in 1637). Simon Meyer, a present member and ringer, recounted the words of a priest "Bell ringing is the most fascinating aspect of English culture. It is so intriguing and ancient and unchanged in secret. No one has any idea about it, really, but it's hidden in plain sound". The Cathedral bells rang in sorrow when I was present at the memorial service for those in the 1989 Bowbelle/Marchioness River Thames tragedy. Whilst he was there Mr. Page met the cleverly named Southwark Cathedral adopted cat "Doorkins Magnificat".

As well as having eight bells the church at Stow Bardolph in Norfolk has a macabre wax effigy of Sarah Hare who died in 1744. Both Peter Ross and I have enjoyed talks with Lady Rose Hare who like Lady Harriet Bligh was a daughter of Esme, 9th Earl of Darnley.

Up to Durham with its mighty Cathedral so dramatically viewed from the train. Peter Ross quotes the words of Sir Walter Scott "Half church of God, half castle 'gainst the Scot". And I think of seeing Bishop John Habgood being enthroned on the highest throne of Christendom.

Further north in Edinburgh Mr. Ross has many a tale to tell of Old St. Paul's, "a black arrow of soot dark stone", founded in 1689 and a part of the Scottish Episcopel Church. Standing close to Edinburgh Waverley Station we both have frequently climbed the Calvary Stair, one step for each of the 33 years of Christ's life, from the street to the church.

We can share our love of churches with our own particular stories. The other Sunday, with fellow Cobham ringers, we shared our skill ringing touches of Plain Bob Doubles and Grandsire Doubles and it was good to hear later in the village the kind comment "Nice to hear the bells". There is the chance to share the treasures of the mobile library service in Cobham scheduled to visit on May 7th and 21st.





The first Sunday in May is Rogation Sunday. This is when many parishes still 'beat the bounds'. Rogation means an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land. The practice began with the Romans, who processed around the cornfields each Spring, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, in order to get rid of evil. About 465 AD the Western world was suffering from earthquake and storm. Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields. Thus 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial. It arrived in England early in the eighth century. Each Spring, led by the priest, a little party from the parish would set out with a Cross to trace the boundaries of the parish. They'd implore God to keep their corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to harvest. In the days when maps were scarce, 'beating the bounds' helped remind everyone just where the boundaries were. Do you know yours today?
