North Kent Embroiderers

Hello everyone, we recently had a visit from a lady called Kate Hasted <u>https://www.katehasted.co.uk/</u>. She came to talk us about her passion for marbling. We learnt how the technique of Japanese marbling called 'suminagashi' (meaning floating ink) dates back to the 12th century was a closely guarded secret for many years. Kate was fascinated by the patterns that evolved.




More recently, Kate has become interested in a different method of marbling on fabric known as 'ebru marbling' which originates from Central Asia, specifically Türkiye at the beginning of the Ottoman Empire in the 16th Century. Here a range of coloured inks are swirled onto thickened water to give beautiful patterns such as those that you can see here.






The fabric for some of Kate's products is printed in the UK using an eco-friendly fabric made from recycled plastic bottles and plastic packaging materials, whilst other items are made using Kate's exclusive hand marbled textiles which are then digitally printed onto silk chiffon. Kate works from her studio in Tunbridge Wells.

We were fascinated to see the beautiful range of patterns that Kate had created and to see her demonstration of the 'suminagashi' technique. We saw how the beautiful single colour patterns developed from a few drops of ink onto a tray of water. This of course set us thinking as to how we could use these ideas in our own work on fabric! It will be interesting to see what our creative members come back with to the next meeting

- I Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants.
- 2 Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining.
- 3 Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas)
- 4 Collect rainwater and investigate ways to recycle water for irrigation.
- 5 Regularly hoe off weeds.
- 6 Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days
- 7 Mow lawns weekly
- 8 Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges.
- 9 Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring-flower bulbs.

10 Watch out for viburnum beetle and lily beetle grubs.



COBHAM LINKS WITH BATURYN IN UKRAINE.

Baturyn is a large village in N.E. UKRAINE $% \mathcal{A}$ in the Omblast $\{ \mathsf{county} \}$ called CHENIVIV

Cobham is a rural village in N.W. KENT

Baturyn's history goes back a long way as it was the land of the Cossacks Cobham's history can be traced back to Roman times but it is well known for its mediaeval history.

One of its famous villagers was Proko Povych

Cobham has been home to one of the World's renowned architects – Sir Herbert Baker whose home in the village was Owletts, a large Georgian mansion in the main street.

Agriculture is the main industry in Baturyn, apple orchards are plentiful as is honey

Cobham is surrounded by apple orchards and there is a small group of local people making honey. But now there are as many vineyards around the village as there are orchards.

Baturyn has large and hugely decorative churches and the villagers are either Orthodox Ukranian or Lutheran

Our church in Cobham is not as decorative as those in Ukraine but it is of geat historical value and has the best preserved Mediaeval brasses in Europe. In Baturyn the churches are known for their mosaics, the major

church in Baturyn is the Church of The Resurrection

Cobham has an almshouse for local elderly people

Baturyn has a similar system for looking after its elderly too.

Local talents are well exercised in Baturyn as they have annual music and drama festivals.

CADS together with our Cobham Community choir entertain the village throughout the year.

Cobham is surrounded by Parkland and woodland, Jeskyns, Ashenbank, North West Kent Downs and woodland.

Baturyn has a fire fighting service because of its vast parkland Both villages have schools and though Cobham doesn't have a secondary school in the village it does have a Nursery and a Primary School.

Business is important, certainly for agriculture in both villages, but Cobham is also a tourist attraction due to its history and link with the Lords of Cobham Hall and Charles Dickens and for both villages there are smaller businesses, there are 4 pubs and two community shops in Cobham and also a railway station.

Now we need our clubs, organisations, and schools to begin to find ways that they can extend this TWINNING initiative to involve their twin in Baturyn. Rosemary Dymond

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

With the bells raised ringing begins, and ends, with rounds 1 2 3 4 5 6 the bells being rung in order from the lightest to the heaviest with the deepest note.

To add variation to the sound an appointed call changer can call bells to change their place in the order by one place; for example '3 to 1' produces 1 3 2 4 5 6. Calls can produce any order but some orders have been given names such as 1 3 5 2 4 6 Queens and 5 3 1 2 4 6 Kings and there are many others. Rope and wheel enabled bell control to be achieved resulting in the unique English art and science of change ringing from which method ringing developed in the 17th century.

With Plain Hunt each bell follows a regular path from the front or lead up to the back or behind and down to the front again. Even numbered bells start by moving down in order while the odd move up in order.

To extend the number of changes possible various variations were introduced in the paths of the bells that the ringer has to achieve with his bell control such as dodges with another bell or making places by staying in the same order for a certain time. Fabian Stedman published 'Campanologia' in 1668 setting out rules or procedures for extended patterns of changes to be rung. Core methods such as Plain Hunt, Grandsire and Stedman have blossomed into other patterns such as Norwich, London and Cambridge. Computers have helped develop new patterns given exotic names.

Starting with the core patterns which the ringer learns, the ringer then, whilst constantly counting their place, must try to weave their bell in the correct place amidst the ever changing order.

Bell ringing is a hobby to be enjoyed. If you diligently learn to strike your bell well you will be a much valued and welcome member of a tower band. Ahead of you can be many opportunities for you to develop your ringing knowledge and skill as far as you wish. And in this Country there are thousands of interesting churches to visit and in which to enjoy a ring. Welcomes await.

The bells of Luddesdowne Church have been chimed by Janet Weaver who does much else for our two parishes. At the time of writing Janet is in Darenth Valley Hospital following a heart attack. However the news seems encouraging and the Cobham bell ringers send Janet every good wish.





This year is the 1700 anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Athanasius is the theologian behind that creed, and his feast day falls on 2nd May. Athanasius (296-373) was born into a prosperous family in Alexandria in Egypt, and entered the ministry. He was 29 years old when he accompanied Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, to the Church's first great ecumenical Council, at Nicaea in 325. There he saw the Council debate the Person of Christ. How was He the Son of God and also Man? Did He really exist before He was born? If we worship Him, does that mean that we are worshipping two Gods?

When the heresy of Arius, which taught that Christ was not divine, and not eternal, later threatened the church, Athanasius worked with his bishop, Alexander, in framing what became known as the Nicene Creed. Our Lord's full divinity was safeguarded in the words, 'eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one substance with the Father.'

For the next 45 years Athanasius' devotion, scholarship, and forceful leadership established the Nicene Creed in the Christian Church. His enemies, both in Church and state, conspired against him, and he was exiled five times from the See of Alexandria and spent a total of 17 years in flight and hiding. Athanasius' name will always be linked with the triumph of New Testament Christology over every form of reductionism (lessening of the Person of Christ.).
