ST MARY'S CHURCH ROOM REFURBISHMENT APPEAL

The Local Funding Group (LFG) for the St Mary's Church Room (Tin Tabernacle) Refurbishment Appeal recently received some welcome support from an elderly Sole Street resident. The gentleman, who wishes to remain anonymous, commented on the challenging and time-consuming task that the Group are undertaking and promised financial support for the project. His notes are reproduced below.

To: The Local Funding Group and Chairman Plus fellow Sole Street Residents

ST. MARY'S CHURCH ROOM, SOLE STREET FUNDING FOR RE-FURBISHMENT AND REBUILD VIA LFG

Thank you, Chairman, for your confidence in asking me to write these notes to support the above aims of the LFG to complete the above works and to give residents an idea of the complexities for completion. These notes are an addendum to my letter dated 15.6.22. to the LFG Chairman that explain my recent thoughts (Withholding my details, available on request.)

I am a long-term resident of Sole Street (60 years), but I am not a member of the LFG or any council group, but I support the LFG action and their intent with respect to the above.

My background is as a retired electrical project engineer engaged in new build and refurbishment of industrial and chemical manufacturing plants. With intensive build cooperation with owners and other trades and to meet stringent standards and time scales.

I have not been involved in the current LFG preparatory works but these notes are my best knowledge.

It is suggested that the LFG as the finance controller will continue to raise funds and the PCC (Parochial Church Council) will appoint, instruct and supervise the approved contractor to start work. The church will have freedom to inspect the work but must be aware that changes beyond specification will result in additional costs, these may exceed finance availability.

My understanding of the project is as follows:-

The existing Tin Tabernacle, 'St. Mary's Church Room', Sole Street, was built in 1889 from a 'standard' kit of materials bought and erected by locals on garden land gifted by the Architect, Sir Herbert Baker. I understand it has been in use since that date.

Its present state requires extensive works to meet current standards for public buildings construction, retaining its religious and public use and access.

The church is unable to finance such works but remains as owner with moral responsibility to maintain future use as at present.

The current building and proposed replacement is not subject to Council Tax.

The LFG work to meet the Church requirements and raise funds to initiate and progress the project.

It is the PCC's responsibility to appoint and retain an Architect to prepare drawings and specifications to the LFG and Church requirements and to obtain planning permission from the Council

The architect will obtain competitive tenders from five contractors

The contractor selected by the PCC will employ and supervise subcontractors under his control via site meetings

The PCC will instruct the approved contractor to start work.

On instructing the contractor the PCC will take on the management role.

I have questioned the apparent VAT on the project, but I understand this cannot be reclaimed.

There is an important time constraint when planning approval expires on 28th October when renewal of approval will require an additional cost and maybe the proposed tender has expired. This urgency will depend on a quick response to the current request for donations.

I support the proposed circular letter appeal to all Sole Street residents (and others) and feel it should be wholeheartedly supported.

The arithmetical shortfall against the 348 residents is obvious. Not obvious is the number of unknown costs that will inevitably arise during the project may require extra cash.

A generous response to this appeal will illustrate residents' appreciation of this village asset. To this end I am happy to enclose my cheque for an early start to this appeal, subject only to the ongoing clause for repayment if the project fails.

The LFG will help Cobham Church Parochial Church Council who will be responsible for the project.

The LFG gratefully appreciate this help and the assessment of the tasks ahead We wish to invite other residents to follow the generosity expressed, by making a donation to:

North Kent Embroiderers


Hello Everybody,

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

To celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and conclude the Cobham events for the Jubilee we rang a Quarter Peal on Sunday evening, 5th June 2022 of 1,260 changes of Grandsire Doubles in 47 minutes. The band was 1. David Gyles 2. Peter Hartley 3. Byron Aldous 4. Mike Hyde 5. Stuart Edwards (who had the added responsibility of conducting the quarter by making the calls and unscrambling any evolving tangles in the order of the bells) 6. Christian Antrobus.

The first bell No. I is always called the Treble and ours was cast in 1907 by Gillet and Johnson of Croydon and given by Ivo, the cricketing 8th Earl of Darnley to mark the 21st birthday of his son Esme, Lord Clifton who became the 9th Earl of Darnley. The last bell No. 6 is always called the Tenor and is the heaviest of the ring. Our Tenor weighs 15cwt. and was cast in 1632 by Joseph Hatch. This centuries old bell has never before rung for a Platinum Jubilee and when might it next, if ever, ring in celebration of a seventy year reign?

Probably in that unknown future Grandsire Doubles, composed by the Clerk of the Pantry to King Charles I, Mr. Roan, around 1650 might be a chosen method for bell ringers are happy to remain loyal to the old favourites. In Doubles methods the front bells change their required order with every pull of the rope as long as the skilled ringers are concentrating hard and diligently counting, in their heads, their ever changing place. The Tenor bell stays at the back as the last to strike in each change of six giving the ringing a steady rhythm.

Events come and events go and bells remain relying on their ringers to give them their voice.



The next **Meopham Library Writing Group** meeting will be on *Thursday 4th August 2022* at 10am until about midday. There is a different writing theme each month and everyone is invited to write a short story, poem or article, using less than 1,000 words. - 10 Feed the soil with green manures

Parishioner, Andrew Clark attended an audience with the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Right Reverend Doctor Justin Welby at Ashford Picture House on the 13th of April, the event was hosted by Kent Invicta Chamber. Guests were intrigued to hear what the Archbishop would say to the businessmen and women of Kent. Andrew has provided us with a flavour of the discussions:

What does the church expect from business? The question was raised - what do businesses want from the church and what do churches want from business? The Archbishop answered that businesses should play their part in the wider community. He quoted catholic teaching that a business as an endeavour of people working "for the common good" i.e. not just for profit but of its employees and beyond.

On current global challenges. The three things which will occupy the next council of Anglican bishops from across the globe are:-

- Resilience
- Climate and sustainability (the Church of England has committed to being carbon neutral across all its operations including schools by 2030).
- The war in Ukraine

Resilience is dealing with surprises – the "black swan" event- i.e. you never thought there was such a thing and then one comes along. It includes making good business decisions, such as not betting on one thing but spreading your risks and commercial interests, but also having a sense of purpose. He illustrated this by referring to a successful development project his wife had led in Sudan, which was about educating and equipping those in poor and war torn areas to build their own lives and communities.

On town centres and high street retail. Town centres have got to bring communities together and create a sense of place and identity. They must be prepared to reimagine and work in partnership – so for example, it is no good having a great restaurant in the town centre if the streets don't feel safe or conversely a really safe space where there is nothing to do! It is not going to work to just try and get Debenhams back. The bible ends with a vision not of the countryside, but of building a city – Jerusalem. People want the sense of security and community of the city.

National Allotment Week - 9th to 15th August

What creepy crawlies are lurking in your allotment? This year, National Allotment Week has teamed up with the Big Bug Survey to try and find out. The theme of the week is Bugs, Bees and Broccoli, and the aim is to acknowledge the importance of gardening with nature in mind. As the National Allotment Society (NAS) says, allotments are "a complex web of plants, micro-organisms, fungi, insects and animals that not only produces food but also supports eco-system services such as pollination and offers a refuge for wildlife in urban areas."

And Bugslife points out: "Bugs are so important to the healthy functioning of our allotments. We tend to focus on the 'pests' and ignore all the great work the other bugs are doing for us. They are pollinating our fruit and veg, controlling our pests and improving our soil."
