On a bright September morning, I joined others in placing flowers at the Gravesend statue of our late Queen as a mark of my respect.



A MESSAGE FROM BISHOP JONATHAN TO THE PARISHES

"None of us could have imagined that the first time I would be speaking to you as your new bishop would be in the sad circumstances of the death of Her Majesty the Queen.

The news of her death came as a huge shock to all of us. It's just beginning to sink in.

Her Majesty has been a beacon of Christian faith, hope, and love to us in this nation, to the Church of England, to the Commonwealth, and indeed to the wider world for these past 70 years of her reign.

Rightly, we feel a great sense of sadness and of loss as we mourn her passing. At the same time, in the days ahead, quite rightly, we'll pause to remember and to give thanks for a tremendous example of Christian service. For the way in which she has been a beacon of stability, of faith and hope to our nation throughout her reign.

At the same time of course, in our sadness, we stand alongside His Majesty the King and the whole Royal Family in their bereavement and loss, and we seek to uphold them in our prayers.

Thank you for all that you are doing in your local communities to open your churches as places of reflection and prayer. I know that many of our churches will see many visitors coming this Sunday and next Sunday as people gather to seek solace and support and comfort in a time of loss and of uncertainty for our nation.

At the heart of Her Majesty's life was her faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. That faith which, she spoke about so openly in recent years, that faith which sustained her in all the ups and downs of the life of our nation, and in need in her own life. We remember her dignity and courage at the time of the loss of her dear husband Prince Philip. We remember also the way in which she has led our nation in times of celebration and in times of sorrow.

Thank you for the ways in which you will support your local communities in the days ahead. May we all be inspired by Her Majesty's Christian example. May we hold to the faith that was so central to her life and may we bring the message of faith, hope and love which inspired her, and through her inspired so many, to those whom we seek to serve in this Diocese of Rochester.

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

With a decades long love of history and a delight in reading, sitting amidst the centuries of Cobham College, I have been intrigued by a book (published in 1914) which I have been loaned "Bell Towers and Bell Hanging" by Sir Arthur Percival Heywood, Bart., President of the Central Council of Bell Ringers (founded 1891), a Member of the Ancient Society of College Youths (established 1637 and the oldest ringers society in the world) and "of other Ringing Associations". The family and baronetcy continue to this day as recorded in Burke's Peerage but typically Sir Arthur's bell ringing prowess is ignored. I wonder if any of the family ring today.

Writing just over a century ago Sir Arthur includes various ringing topics and mentions "Occasions of great public rejoicing have always been celebrated by the ringing of bells. Her Majesty's Jubilee, for instance, in 1887, and the celebration of the sixtieth year of her reign in 1897, have occasion for much ringing of peals, and also to the rehanging and restoration of church bells all over the country". I certainly have rung some Victorian Jubilee bells amongst the 637 towers in which I have rung, and been distracted by the always fascinating churches.

In June this year we rang a quarter peal in celebration of the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II and advised Her Majesty at Windsor Castle of our ringing. We have now received from Balmoral Castle a Message of grateful thanks from The Queen together with a letter from the Lady-in-Waiting addressed to the Bellringers of St. Mary Magdalene Church, Cobham, Kent.

"The Queen wishes me to thank you very much for your letter, and for the news you sent of the quarter peal of bells you rang in St. Mary Magdalene Church, Cobham, on Sunday 5th June, in celebration of the seventieth anniversary of Her Majesty's Accession to the Throne.

It gave The Queen great pleasure to hear that her milestone Platinum Jubilee was marked in this special way; Her Majesty was especially touched to know of the pride you felt in expressing your loyal support whilst drawing your community festivities to a close.

Your thoughtfulness is much appreciated, and I am to thank you again for taking the trouble to write as you did."

Down the centuries celebrations and bells have gone together. From national to local, from Balmoral to Cobham there is reason to rejoice with bells. On August Bank Holiday Monday we rang a quarter peal for the Cobham Fete.

As we didn't meet in August I thought I would write about a visit I made to the Fashion and Textile Museum to see the exhibition entitled "Crown to Catwalk" - I50 Years of the Royal School of Needlework. The exhibition travelled through the one hundred and fifty years since the school was established in 1872 by Lady Victoria Welby. Her aim was "To revive a beautiful art which had fallen into disuse and, through its revival, to provide employment for edu-

cated women who, without a suitable livelihood, would otherwise find themselves compelled to live in poverty." The piece shown here is entitled "An Unfinished Symphony in Stitch" and it was made by the members of the RSN Embroidery Studio in February 2022 for the Worshipful Company of Broderers' Exhi-



bition. It is a contemporary twist on a traditional Jacobean design worked on linen

with woollen threads and paint.

There were of course many other beautiful pieces as well as information about Queen Victoria's funeral pall where the fabulous goldwork stitching was completed incredibly in twenty one hours by forty five women from the RSN working continuously.

31st October All Hallows Eve – or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers. Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. Ist November – All Saints' Day – was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'. For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

Agatha Christie's Mousetrap

It was 70 years ago, on 6th October 1952, that the world premiere of Agatha Christie's play, *The Mousetrap*, opened in Nottingham. It then opened in London on 25th November, and is still going, making it the world's longest-running play.

Originally a short radio play written as a birthday present for Queen Mary, it was broadcast in May 1947. The stage play, a murder mystery, has been performed more than 28,000 times – the only break being, because of the Covid pandemic, between 16th March 2020 and 17th May 2021. The play also made theatrical history by having an original "cast member" survive all the changes since its opening night. The late Deryck Guyler can still be heard, on a recording, reading the radio news bulletin in the play. There have been many physical alterations, with the set being changed in 1965 and 1999, but one original prop survives – the clock above the fireplace in the main hall.

Christie regarded detective fiction as a distinctively moral genre because it deals with questions of guilt and justice that are at times almost theological. The society and milieu of her stories are distinctively Christian. She was baptised into the Church of England and kept her mother's copy of *The Imitation of Christ* – a spiritual handbook – by her bedside. Its flyleaf carried a quotation from Romans, beginning "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" At her memorial service in 1976, her publisher William Collins described her as having a "gentle Christian spirit".

Our September meeting was well attended. Our speaker for the afternoon had entitled her talk "Felt Like Fun" and it was indeed exactly that! Two sisters, Roz Dace and Judy Balchin had, during their working lives, been a "crafty pair" and when they retired, they decided to go into business together using those skills and, having covered all the boring bits of starting up a business, calling themselves "The Woolly Felters", they got down to creating felted people and animals. The talk was given by Judy Balchin, who was friendly and full of fun. Among the characters that they had created, were people well known and recognisable like Boris Johnson, Donald Trump and the Queen and her corgis. All of these had been accurately portrayed through the process of "dry felting". Fabrics for the clothing with which they were dressed, were created by "wet felting". They had also created a house for their felted people called "Felty Towers".

Judy explained the difference between "wet felting", which is a way of forming a supple fabric, and "dry felting", which is a way of transforming sheep's fleece into solid shapes, using a barbed needle with a stabbing action.

The audience was enchanted by her stories and the passing of time went unnoticed. A great deal of interest was shown during the question time and we all shared a splendid "tea and cake" time afterwards.

At our April Spring Show, our members had an opportunity to show off their cooking, flower arranging and horticultural skills. On October 5th the artists, crafters and photographers amongst us have their chance at our annual Autumn Show, when we will see some of the beautiful work that they have created over the past two years.


Remembrance and the Poppy Appeal


