A letter from the Vicar, The Rev'd Pam Davies

Dear friends,

This time in the church's year is known as the 'Kingdom Season.' It includes 'All Saint's Day,' 'All Soul's Day' and 'Remembrance Sunday.'

On all Saints Day we remember and reflect on those who have gone before us in terms of our faith.

On All Soul's Day we reflect on and remember our loved ones who are no longer with us but have supported and encouraged on our life journey.

On Remembrance Sunday we reflect on those who have given their lives for their country and have inspired courage and bravery.

They are all about remembering.

But there is more to remembering than mere recollection. We don't recall events just to test our memories. The function of memory is much richer. There is something in our processing – our mulling, sifting, and discerning of events that makes memories richer. It is easy to recall things, but memories are what we hold, value, and give us a richer meaning in what we discern.

Remembering is a deeper mystery in which the past, the present and the future become bound up together. When we remember, we actually re-member in the sense that reassemble and recall. We bring out of the past, into the present those whose lives have influenced in our journey of faith — ranging from those well-known saints to those people who have quietly helped us and journeyed along-side us in our own walk of faith. We bring out of the past and into the present those who we have loved and lost and those whom we still love yet see no longer. We bring to the fore those to whom we owe a debt yet cannot repay or thank enough.

We respond with gratitude and thanksgiving for all those who have gone before us. For those who gave their lives so that we might live. For the sacrificial and costly gifts that have been given and for the yesterdays of others that have enabled our tomorrows. For the souls and saints we cherish, those whom we love, yet no longer see. We remember those who have kept and held us together when we felt that we might fall apart. And we look to the future.

We also remember the love, generosity and goodness of God for each one of us and those we love. He knows each one of us, remembers each one of us and cherishes each one of us. Nothing is lost to him. As we come together to worship and to pray, to be silent and recall, in a real sense we build on the dedication and self-sacrifice of the past for the present and for the building of our future. Please do join us for any of our services during the kingdom season and make it an opportunity of thanksgiving and gratitude to God, to those we have loved and continue to love and to those who have sacrificed so much for us.

Our speaker this month was Beth Power https://www.dottytextiles.com/ talking about 'The Art of 'Stitchscaping' - hand embroidered landscapes. Beth says, "the itch to stitch drew me to my stash" and she told us how her business had taken off during lockdown when she was able to produce many beautiful pieces and started to add 3D elements including shells, to her designs. The range of embroidery stitches used in each piece is amazing and includes bullion knots, French knots, drizzle stitch, seed stitch, running stitch, cross stitch and whip stitch, many of which are used in imaginative ways. Her work is inspired by the landscapes she encounters on a daily basis. Everything Beth does is hand stitched and she brought with her many of her delightful pieces for us to see and handle.

This month was the first one of our postcard challenge – the subject being 'holiday memories.'
Those who were taking part had placed them in an envelope and

BELL RINGING by **Peter Hartley**

High-ho, high-ho it is off to Essex I go for a couple of days bell ringing with friends from Kent, Sussex and Hampshire. We stayed in a gastro-pub between Chelmsford and Colchester which was busy with Essex life. We visited surrounding villages and in their parish churches we rang their 6 bells or occasionally 8 bells. We rang from the ground floor of the church or from the balcony and usually from the ringing room high in the tower. We climbed wooden ladders, negotiated trap doors and wound our way up stone spiral stairs – and down again.

Whilst enjoying the ringing, being an avid church crawler, I always made time to explore the interesting and varied churches. The little church at Little Waltham, built of flint and pebble rubble in the 12th century with a 15th century tower, has a very big church key and a remarkable 13th century parish chest made from a hollowed out trunk of a sycamore tree reinforced with iron straps and six iron locks. The vicar and five reliable men, each with a different key, had to be present to open the chest.

The brick church at Ford End was built in 1871 by public subscription on land given by the local Tufnell family and consecrated by the Bishop of Rochester. Built on a former osier bed there has always been trouble with the foundations. In 1985 the chancel had to be demolished but the nave and, fortunately, the thin tower remain. Next we rang at Great Dunmow Church. There on Sunday, 3rd September 1939 the Vicar, the Reverend Noel Mellish, V.C., M.C., who, as an Army Chaplain was awarded the Victoria Cross in the First World War, had to announce to his congregation the outbreak of the Second World War. In the large graveyard Nahim Rashid "Allah bless you" rests with the many other dead. The glory of Stebbing Church is the rare surviving screen of stone where three fine big arches fill the chancel opening.

Our second ringing day began at brick Galleywood Church built at the expense of Arthur Pryor, Chairman of the brewers Truman, Hanbury and Buxton, and his deeply religious wife. The new church was consecrated on the Feast of Saint Michael and all Angels, 29th September 1873 by the Bishop of Rochester. Just after our visit they were going to celebrate their 150th Birthday when the Bishop of Chelmsford was joining the congregation. The County of Essex had been in the Diocese of Rochester.

Then the County was transferred in 1877 to the new Diocese of St. Albans and to the even newer Diocese of Chelmsford in 1914. Sir Simon Jenkins remarks "The 20th-century Church of England created new bishoprics as fast as it lost congregations".

At Rettendon, dominating the North Aisle, is the surprising and vast marble memorial to Edmund Humphrey who, along with other figures, lies on his side on the projecting base reclining on his right arm. As a bachelor he was the last of the line and had the monument built in his lifetime so he could contemplate it before he died in 1727. Today the parish needs to find £60,000 to have this important memorial professionally cleaned. The Church at Burnham-on-Crouch has an attractive setting standing back from the centre of the town. In 1774 there was a disastrous fire. The new long and low plaster ceilings give the interior its distinctive tunnel-like effect. The oldest of the six bells in the tower was cast in 1415. All part of now from before yesterday.

And so a farewell to today's scene of yachts bobbing on the dappled waters of the River Crouch and the Essex villages where we have rung in their ancient hearts. So often we have seen housing developments being imposed on the village edges. One wondered about adequate roads, schools and health provision. Perhaps somebody is thinking it out - or not! Meanwhile we had ensured that the timeless English sound of bells being rung had floated across today's Essex as it has done for centuries.



Winter is on its way but there is still plenty to do in the garden. Leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots in situ. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies topped up.

RHS - Top Jobs this month

- 1. Clear up fallen leaves especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- 2. Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- 3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- 4. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- 5. Plant out winter bedding
- 6. Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- 7. Insulate outdoor containers from frost bubble wrap works well
- 8. Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
- 9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden

Gardening for a Wilder Kent - Encouraging Bats

If we see bats in our gardens on a warm summer evening it is an enchanting experience. We are lucky some villagers see bats circulate around at dusk using our gardens as a source of food, water and shelter. Bell ringers see bats in church! Bats are not to be fright-



ened of: Shorne is home to yet another endangered species and bats are a truly unique mammal, possessing an ability that no other mammal has. Bats are the only mammal capable of true sustained flight, allowing them to fill a niche in our environment which is specific to them. In Shorne you will mostly see the small pipistrelle which weighs the same as a 2p coin. Bats hibernate for the winter emerging around March if the spring is warm enough then, eating a huge amount of insects to keep them going until the birth of the next generation in June or July and as mammals they suckle their young in the "nursery". They mate in autumn when they gradually become slower and prepare for the coming winter.

A bat's pregnancy lasts between six and nine weeks. The length of the pregnancy depends on the species and can be influenced by weather, climate and availability of food. Bats usually give birth to a single baby (called a pup) each year. They keep their babies close and nurture them carefully. The young bats are suckled by their mothers for four to five weeks until they are old enough to fly. They then begin to venture out from the roost to forage for food. There are fewer wooded areas, ponds and open grass spaces for bats to feed and roost as roads and buildings have now replaced them. These features can also create barriers for some bats. Links to the countryside, like hedges and front gardens that make up green corridors, have been lost or fragmented. That is why it is so important that our gardens are friendly to wildlife including bats.

Careful planning will increase the value of your garden or green space to bats and other wildlife, however small it is. As bats need a huge number of insects, a garden that is good for insects is good for bats. Even a window box or tiny courtyard garden can attract insects, which in turn attract bats. Aim to grow as wide a range of flowers throughout the year as possible to attract a diversity of insects. Daisies with short florets, umbellifers with landing platforms, flowers with long pollen tubes, herbs and aromatic flowers, night scented pale flowers more obvious to moths, aquatic flowers, climbers and flowering trees will support lots of insects which will in turn support bats.

Cats can be a danger to bats and should be kept in for an hour before dusk. Avoid using chemicals to kill insects or in fact any pesticides and try and encourage natural predators such as beetles and ladybirds. Reduce your light pollution! All bats rest in nooks or crannies in dark places during the day and emerging at night to feed. Porch lights, garden security lighting, or decorative lighting on homes and trees, can have a detrimental effect on bats. You can support bats by reducing or turning off your garden lighting. If you like to keep on your security lighting, try changing your settings to a dimmer light or fit hoods or cowls over them to limit light pollution.
